

# CROPPING

17 hectares currently under irrigation



Our seed potatoes continue to germinate and grow. Seed potato takes a shorter time to germinate than table potato, so we are hopeful that this crop will be ready to harvest before any winter frost.

We are pleased with the progress of some late maize we planted in efforts to continue supplying silage to the dairy. This has been our greatest yield of silage from one hectare of maize.

Apprentices have been busy trellising and pruning tomatoes in the last month and our tomato fields are looking fantastic! We are hoping this crop will hit the winter market and therefore bring us a good price.

We have successfully transplanted half a hectare of onions from our seedbed, with a further hectare to transplant in April.

Some of the pecan trees we planted last year became waterlogged in the heavy rains this year. Now that the rains have passed, we are happy to see most of these trees bouncing back to good health.



# LIVESTOCK



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In total our 4 layers houses produced 505,165 eggs in March.  
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We have been particularly pleased with the birds in layer house two. Whilst birds usually maintain a good lay-rate until about 65-75 weeks, these birds are now 80 weeks old but are continuing to lay above the target rate!  
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We were delighted with the result of a broiler batch closed in March. 8080 birds were placed and of those 7463 went for slaughter, with an average weight of 2.72 kg per bird and a decent Food Conversion Ratio of 1.91. This resulted in a profit of 52 cents per bird. Well done to the seven apprentices and their coaches involved in growing the batch!  
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In March we had 36 cows producing an average of 16.7 litres of milk per day. In total we produced 16,592 litres of milk, of which 15,451 litres were saleable.  
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This month the dairy also had 6 heifers reach the correct body weight to go to the bull to be serviced. Some fantastic heifers were born this month, keeping our stock of heifers in line with projections for herd growth.  
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We received a positive visit from the Zimbabwean Dairy Farmers Association in March, who have renewed our licence for another year.  
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
