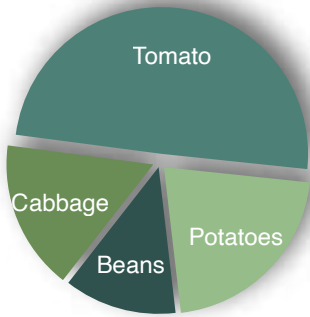

# CROPPING

6 hectares currently under irrigation



Cropping news to celebrate this month is that our tomato harvest in the Eden plots has been hitting 90 tons per hectare! In total we have harvested 120 tons of tomatoes this month.

We have also finished harvesting butternut with a final 4.4 tons harvested this month. At the very end of the month we have begun to harvest some of our potatoes.

There has been no planting in June but plenty of land prep for our summer planting in August. 6 hectares of land to be irrigated by our pivot is at the final stages of preparation and we hope to plant potatoes and lucern grass there in August.

We have harvested 28 crates of pepper from our green house and our green house tomatoes continue to thrive. We look forward to planting more pepper in the next 2 months.

Soil samples from 6 hectares of our land have been collected by the biochemistry department of the National University of Science and Technology (NUST) in Bulawayo and we look forward to receiving the results.



# LIVESTOCK



With the departure of Mncedisi, we have welcomed Fortune Ncube to lead the poultry team. He has been kept busy in his new role, as this month we placed 10-week old layers into our largest layer house, layer house 4. They seem to be settling well.

There has also been the arrival of some much appreciated new equipment in layer house 4 including 2 feeding trollies which have made feeding times much more efficient! We are also working hard to get all the mechanised manure removal belts in layer house 4 working.

Our layer flocks produced a total of 348,333 eggs in June.

The dairy team have had some fun this month as we have started mixing our own feed for the first time! Using our new donated feed mixer we can now buy raw ingredients to mix rather than the more expensive finished product. Not only will this reduce our feed costs but will also help our apprentices learn about the raw ingredients and the nutrients they provide. This is vital for apprentices who want to keep livestock profitably.

In June we had 28 milking cows producing an average of 16.8 litres per cow per day. In total we produced 12,985 litres of milk, 12,131 litres of which was saleable.
