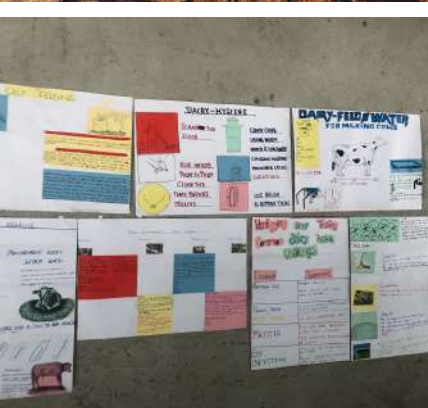
NEWS

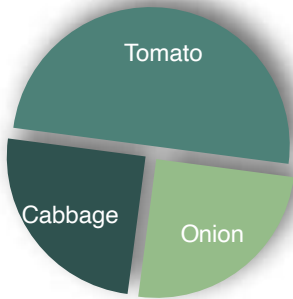

CROPPING

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In July, we harvested 58.4 tonnes of tomatoes. We were grateful to harvest 80% of the crop before a heavy frost took its toll on the remaining tomatoes in the fields.

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We have started harvesting tomatoes from our first greenhouse and they are looking great! In our second greenhouse we are planting bell peppers. Our second year apprentices are enjoying gaining experience in growing techniques under intensive conditions.

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We completed our first proper potato harvest and we are pleased with the results. The quality of the fruit was very good and our positive results give us confidence to plant more potatoes in the next season.

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As well as tomatoes and potatoes, in July we harvested 2,600 bunches of onions.

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This month we completed half of the land preparation necessary for August planting.

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July was a busy month for our pecan team with over 5,000 seedlings grafted throughout the month.

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LIVESTOCK

Our layer team are celebrating July as the first month in a long time where we have not experienced theft! Following an attempted theft and the capture of a culprit on the 1st July, it has been a peaceful and theft-free month for which we are incredibly grateful.



Our layer team have been kept busy in other ways this month, notably with the task of vaccinating the young flock in house 4. That's 18,350 chickens vaccinated one by one!

In total our layers produced 442,691 eggs in July.



July was a turbulent month for the dairy. Cows with infections had to be isolated and yet milked daily. On top of this, the milk chiller stopped working and we were unable to send milk to town for two weeks. A further challenge has been the sudden lack of availability in Zimbabwe of maize bran, one of the main ingredients in our feed.



In all of these challenges, the effort, flexibility and commitment from the dairy team and apprentices has been outstanding. One apprentice has blossomed in her record keeping and milk handling, while another has taken on the responsibility for feeding with determination and a great attitude, even forfeiting their weekend breaks to be at the dairy.
