PRODUCTION

Our broilers continue to do well under the management of our second year lady apprentices. Despite a spike in mortalities due to heat stress, the overall mortality is still low and they are hitting their target weights. We have been taking actions such as installing a curtain to prevent further heat stress as the weather warms up.

A poultry highlight this month has been seeing the birds in our new layer house coming into lay! Apprentices have been enjoying the experience of raising layers and are now becoming expert egg pickers!

There has been a lot happening in our fields and while our plots are small, they are beautiful and productive! We have successfully transplanted Chinese cabbage and we are pleased that our okra and cabbages are now ready for sale. Our onion is not far off being ready for harvest and is looking good.

First year apprentices have worked hard in recent months to grow a plot of maize using Foundations for Farming conservation principles, which they have been learning in their Agriculture lessons. Their hard work has paid off and their crop is looking healthy and fruitful as it nears harvest.
